Dear Rotarians,

2016-2017 was a great year for the Rotary Club of Grass Valley. We pulled off two major fund raisers this year, our 27th annual Casino Night in February and the 4th annual Gold Country Bike Challenge held May 20.

Our presence was felt out in the community as we rang the bell for the Salvation Army kettle drive and adopted a family to provide presents at Christmas. Union Hill School received new paint and lots of TLC in their garden area on October 8.

The Halloween Book Giveaway is always a big hit with kids and adults alike as we dress up in costume for the GV downtown Trick or Treat event and hand out books to the preschoolers.

Rotary at Work Day found us cleaning and repainting the NEO youth booth at the fairgrounds. One of the most challenging projects we undertook was assisting the Salvation Army in feeding 800 evacuees from the Oroville area when there was a danger of the dam breaking.

The young population of Nevada County is very important to us. This year we continued the tradition of honoring students from Lyman Gilmore Middle School at a monthly luncheon. We hosted an inbound exchange student from Denmark who apparently thought that because he was coming to California he didn't need a winter coat. Of course, GV Rotarians took good care of him in style. There was the ever popular high school music contest, speech contest and also a county wide middle school speech contest. Three high school juniors were sent to RYLA leadership camp and twelve eighth graders went to REGLE. These kids are amazing!

The Rotary Club of Grass Valley updated its club brochure, the Past President's Advisory committee met to offer sage advice to our president, our three little libraries were always stocked with free books for the community, and the club gave \$6,000 in high school scholarships and \$10,000 to youth service projects.

Ten new Rotarians were inducted into the club this year. Sadly, we lost one Rotarian on June 27 when our friend Steve Sauer passed away.

We worked hard and we played hard. On August 19, many of us attended a River Cats ball game in Sacramento. October 3 found us gathered in fellowship at a pizza party in the home of Lee and Joanne Osnas. One of November's highlights was a fun evening social at Club 151 and after pledging funds to the Rotary Foundation at our annual Foundation drive, we celebrated with a grand dinner with all of the other Area 4 Rotary clubs.

A large group cleared out of town in August and headed to Europe on a river cruise for a few weeks. They missed Rotary so much, they held a meeting on board the ship. That's dedication!

The Polio Plus contributions grew every week as members filled the blue cups placed on their lunch tables at the Holbrooke Hotel. We passed the hat for our wait staff at Christmas to help brighten their holiday.

Globally, we participated in a grant to help fund the nursing school at the Uganda hospital set up by Dr. Scott Kellerman.

It's easy to see why the Rotary Club of Grass Valley won so many "Best of" awards at the District Conference for 2016-2017. We live the Rotary "Service above Self" motto.

I. President's Review

Dear Rotarians,

This has been a terrific year for the Rotary Club of Grass Valley, a year of growth and accomplishment. The membership of the club has grown from 59 to 69 members, a majority of which are women. This has brought the club new energy and ideas. We have also addd new types of membership for families and corporations to meet their needs and give them the opportunity to participate in Rotary. This has also been a year of generous giving by club members. Club members donated over \$4,800 to help victims of Hurricanes Harvey and Irma and fire victims here in Nevada County.

The Club has also made over \$6,500 in community donations thus far this year and made additional in-kind service donations. We also give \$6,000 each year in college scholarships to promising high school graduates. The Club has donated \$3,000 to the effort to eradicate Polio through the Rotary Polio Plus fund. The Club was equally generous with the Rotary Foundation. The Club members donated over \$21,000 during our October Foundation drive. This was capped off by a \$25,000 donation to the Foundation on behalf of Wyn Spiller, our most accomplished Rotarian. With that, our club achieved the highest per capita contribution to the Foundation of any club in the 5190 District—over \$700 per member!

The Club's major fund raiser, our annual Casino Night was a great success. The theme was Mardi Gras and the Casino was filled with colorful masks, feathers and beads. We raised over \$25,000 for use in our Community donations and support. Our Second fund raiser, the Gold Country Bike Challenge is in its fifth year and still growing. The event will be held on May 17, with bikers challenging our difficult terrain in several 54 mile-plus rides, ending up with a barbecue meal at the scenic Nevada County Fairgrounds. Last year we raised over \$6,000 and expect to do even better this year.

Our major service project for the year was to plant trees in public areas where they are needed. This was inspired by our Rotary International President Ian Riseley's call for Rotarians to plant at least one tree for each Rotarian this year. With a \$2,000 matching grant from District 5190, our club donated over \$4,000 worth of trees both larger and small to public areas in Nevada County. We gave trees to the Nevada County Fairgrounds to help them replace some of the many trees that are dying due to the drought and bark beetle. We also planted 100 small trees in the area known as the Big Sinkhole which the City of Grass Valley has been restoring after it collapsed in last year's deluge. We also helped out the City with its new planned mini park that is to act as an entrance way to the downtown which we planted on Rotary at Work day April 28th. We provided trees and a work party to the effort which has greatly improved the look of the City entrance.

Our club has a strong youth services program which we continued and expanded this year. We sent 8 students to REGLE-Rotary Eight Grade Leadership Academy and three high school students to RYLA, the Rotary Youth Leadership Academy.

We have adopted the Lyman Gilmore Middle School as our adopted school, and each month we honor five students as Student of the Month for their grade. We are particularly excited that we are working with the Lyman Gilmore Student Leadership Club to become a combined Leadership and Interact Club to do projects with our Rotary Club. We have contributed to help fund a program for Lyman Gilmore students to participate in Sierra Harvest's program to educate students on organic farming and the joys of fresh vegetables from the garden. We also sponsored a Rotary Youth Exchange student from Brazil, Ruth.

Other Club accomplishments this year include:

- Organized a successful Area Rotary Community Awards Dinner recognizing local businesses and volunteers
- Updated and issued our Area Rotary Business and Professional Directory
- Worked on needed repairs at the Kare Crisis Nursery to assist them in their efforts to provide a safe refuge for children of families in crisis
- Donated Christmas wreathes and placed them on veteran's graves in Grass Valley cemeteries
- Rang Bells for the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal
- Provided Christmas gifts for the children of a needy family through the Salvation Army\Toys for Tots program
- Gave away books to elementary school students at Halloween to encourage them to read
- Participated in an Area Tree giveaway, giving away over 400 trees to further RI President Riseley's call to plant trees
- Continued our multi-year effort to complete a District International Grant to ship medical equipment and supplies to the Bwindi Community Hospital in Uganda

It has been a great year for our club, doing good in our Community and the World. It has been an honor to be your president leading you in that effort.

I. President's Review



Dear Rotarians,

This has been a year to remember for the Rotary Club of Grass Valley and the Area 4 of District 5190. For the first time in Area 4 history, all five clubs, and the AG, were lead by women. With the good came the not-so-good. Our club membership endured several significant losses with the passing of our dear friends and long-time Rotarians, Chuck Elizondo, past president and past DG, our dear Tom Lathrop, past Executive Secretary, and past president Steve Sarantopolous. Rest in Peace!

The year started with several goals to strengthen and retain our membership. We restructured the dues, loosened the attendance requirements to move away from the punitive method hoping to encourage member participation in Rotary as their schedule, lives, and commitments allow. The member numbers did stay solid though no net gain overall.

The District Governor's call to promote and support World Polio Day was met with much to do in Area 4. Our Club lead a program with the Board of Supervisors with a presentation by the County Health Officer Dr. Ken Cutler and myself highlighting the work Rotary has done to eradicate Polio and promote vaccinations to prevent the disease. We had all five club presidents join in on our local radio station KNCO, to promote our events and share the work of Rotary. And despite power outages (aka PSPS), we held Area World Polio Day events. Ours was at the 1849 Brewery to raise awareness, provide education, and raise funds for the cause.

Our Club members joined in on the October RAKE – Random Acts of Kindness event to help beautify our community. Members painted tables, parking stances, a bathroom, pulled blackberry bushes, and collected trash at Condon Park on a Saturday in October. This one-day event supported the ANEW Day program, and our Club was also one of the event sponsors.

Members joined to support the California Care Force event, a free two-day dental, vision, and medical health clinic in January 2020, by providing and serving lunch to the many working volunteers. United Way sponsored the event with many other local organizations and medical professionals making it a very successful weekend-long event.

Our Club continued its strong youth services program by again sending ten students to REGLE-Rotary Eight Grade Leadership

Academy in the Fall. I joined in for the weekend-long program at Camp Grizzly for the "full" experience. What a wonderful time for those students and myself included. We have the Lyman Gilmore Middle School as our adopted school, and each month we honor five students as Student of the Month for their grade. We support their Interact Leadership Club and involve them in Rotary activities when possible.

The Club has made over \$6,500 in community donations thus far in 2020 and made additional in-kind service donations. We also gave \$5,000 in college scholarships to promising high school graduates. The Club has donated over \$2,200 to the effort to eradicate Polio through Club fundraising and direct donations by members to the Rotary Polio Plus fund exceeding our \$1,500 goal. The Club was equally generous with the Rotary Foundation. The Club members donated over \$18,000 to the Rotary International Foundation with a very successful drive and increased members participating in Rotary Direct. Members stepped up to shatter our goal of \$14,000. As of May, our Club achieved a per capita giving of \$261 per member, the highest in the Area, and topped the district average of \$161.

The Club's major fundraiser, our annual Casino Night, was a great success. The theme was Roaring 20's and promoted as Rotary – A Night at the Speakeasy. The evening was well attended by many flappers and gents. We raised over \$24,000 for use in our Community donations and support. As we began March, an unimaginable crisis was brewing that quickly spread to all corners of the globe. It was a worldwide pandemic with a coronavirus known as COVID-19.

It brought our lives and our Club to a stand-still. After the initial shock and coming to terms with how this massive event was affecting every portion of our daily lives, the Club began coming back out in a virtual meeting world on Zoom.

Our second fundraiser, the Gold Country Bike Challenge was first postponed, then canceled. Soon more cancellations followed, beginning with the music contest, then the RYLA program, for whom we had chosen three high school students to attend, followed eventually by REGL. One by one, all Rotary in-person events were canceled and either replaced with a virtual version or altogether canceled. The RI Conference went "virtual" in a first time ever production and was fairly successful in bringing Rotarians together from around the world. We adapted to a new way of meeting and maintaining our desire to serve our communities.

We applied for and were successful in receiving a matching grant for COVID-related support. We helped to fund the purchase of a much-needed power pallet jack for the Food Bank of Nevada County. They had seen a massive leap in demand in their food distribution activities to meet the community's needs. They were thrilled with this equipment addition which allowed them to move pallets full of food products around the warehouse and load their trucks headed out to their distribution sites.

Other Club accomplishments this year include:


- Rang bells for the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal
